

Harbury Village Conservation Area

In 1998 the Planning Committee at Stratford-on-Avon District Council amended the Conservation Area boundary for Harbury.

Conservation Area a)

The old buildings at the top of Station Road and the B4552, extended around Harbury House and Bury Barn.

Hall Lane, the Pound and the Spinney and the older houses through Hall Lane to the centre of the village.

Harbury Hall, the Coach House and Stable Cottage in Bull Ring Lane.

The Club, Crown Inn, Church House and Church House Cottage in Crown Street.

Lullington Lodge, The Dovecote and stone cottages in Dovehouse Lane.

All Saints Church and the Church Paddock in Church Street.

Older type houses in Vicarage Lane – stone and brick.

The cottages in Church Street and the building now known as Banana Moon Nursery.

Centre of Harbury – all of the High Street, including the library, chemist, Co-op and the stone cottages on the other side of the road.

All cottages in Church Terrace and Bull Ring Garage and Bull Ring Business Centre.

All of Chapel Street, including Gamecock, Fox Close, Flecknoe House, the Old Bakery, Saddlers, Bridles, the cottages and Park Lane Terrace.

Mill Lane houses, Childyke, Montgomery House and the Windmill.

Mill Street – the Supermarket and the stone cottages on either side of the road and Chesterton House Farm.

Conservation Area b)

This is the old ‘bottom end’ of the village. It extends from the Manor House, Manor Stable and Manor Cottage along the western end of Park Lane into Temple End. The old stone buildings are Temple House, Temple House Cottage, New Stone House, Sheen Farmhouse, Pool Farm, Pool Yard and Pool Cottage. On the other side of the road are Dennys Close, Hillcote, Juxta Pacem, Chain Cottage, Temple Cottage, Skipple Place, Forelle and The Old New Inn.

Both sides of the road in Farm Street, including Farm Close.

Houses off the Green in Binswood End and the cottages at the side of Leycester Close.

Many of the Greens in the Conservation Area are seen as community assets and therefore protected from being built upon.
